Part of the funds will ensure that these students will have scholarships all four years of their undergraduate educations, as long as they meet the program requirements. ◆ The FWA is also organizing an undergraduate career conference that will be held at BMO Capital Markets in New York.

<p>National Educational Association of Disabled Students</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ◆ Equity Through Education funds are supporting several initiatives: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Job Search Strategy Forums ▪ Scholarships (established in 2007) ▪ Enhancement of the Nows job site ▪ Development of a mentorship program <p><u>Job Search Strategy Forums</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ◆ Equity Through Education funds are supporting a series of 16 Job Search Strategy Forums across the country ◆ The forums assist post-secondary students with disabilities to make a successful transition from school to work. ◆ Forums have already been held in Toronto, Edmonton, Victoria, Montreal, Halifax, Ottawa (twice), Winnipeg, St. John's Thunder Bay, London, Vancouver, Fredericton and Saskatoon with nearly 900 attendees. ◆ Upcoming forum locations include Ottawa, Quebec City and Calgary. <p><u>Scholarships</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ◆ Equity Through Education has funded twenty-one scholarships to date. ◆ Up to 12 scholarships are awarded annually in the categories of university undergraduate (a minimum of one in each of Arts and Science); graduate/professional; and, college.
